Pupil Premium Grant – 18/19

Summary

The pupil premium grant is a Department of Education funding scheme to help improve the life chances of pupils from a disadvantaged background. Funding is calculated on the basis of the number of pupils who fall into a set of agreed categories, such as in receipt of Free School Meals.

The following is a summary of the funding received by Edith Cavell Primary School and how it has been used to benefit the pupils.

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2018/19

- Additional TA support across the school to support well-being, small group targeted activities and transition
- Additional TA support in Key Stage 1 and 2 to enable small group phonics groups to deliver Sounds Write to support children's learning in a more individual way.
- Booster sessions for eligible and targeted Year 6 pupils to support, reinforce learning and develop assessment craft in preparation for Y6 SAT's.
- TA support for each class enables the specific needs of groups of pupils to be supported
- TA support to reception children to facilitate transition to Year and consolidate Y1 readiness.
- The learning mentor provides an opportunity for vulnerable children to discuss matters that may be a barrier to their emotional well-being and learning.
- The involvement in a well-being imitative to raise awareness across the school and support identified vulnerable children.
- After school clubs support pupils who struggle academically to extend and develop the areas of interest to them
- Crash course swimming lessons to support identified pupils to master this essential life skill
- Attendance at holiday sports clubs enabled individuals to develop and rehearse communication, behaviour and social skills with unknown children and unfamiliar adults
- Meeting the costs of numerous Educational visits for vulnerable pupils enables them to benefit from the all round value and learning experiences of Educational visits.
- Educational shows and visitors to the school, to talk about their areas of expertise and interest gives children a different perspective on the topics that they are studying and an opportunity to learn in different, exciting and memorable ways.
- Group music lessons have enabled the children to develop skills and interests not previously explored and have experience of playing an individual instrument.
- As part of fulfilling 'The New School Food Plan' from January 2015, children qualifying for pupil premium funding have been provided with 189ml of milk (one third of a pint) each day.

Measuring the impact of PPG spending

This funding has supported disadvantaged pupils to either; at least maintaining their previous year/KS1 position; make accelerated progress to at least return to this standard or make accelerated progress to improve on the previous year/KS1 position if this was low.

It has additionally provided:-

- Opportunity for children to take part in educational visits
- Alleviation of anxiety about National Y6 tests
- Improvement in well-being, self-esteem and resilience.
- Awareness of readiness for learning
- Opportunity for talents to be developed that are not part of the main curriculum.
- Focus on good attendance at school and the impact that has on pupil achievement
- Children more aware of the areas they need to develop and what they can do to make progress and meet the targets set.
